## Mayor's Message

In March this year I suggested to Council that we should make 2015 the "Year of the Port". It was an idea that was well received by our Elected Members and is now being promoted around the city. The timing is right. For a start, in October this year we will celebrate the 175th anniversary of Port Adelaide. That was when a new landing place at the end of what is now Commercial Road was officially opened and referred to as the New Port.

This year, too, we have started to see the results of major co-investment by Port Adelaide Enfield Council and the state government, with whom we have developed a genuine partnership to promote local and regional economic growth. We've had the Port Adelaide Renewal Project, with a total budget of over \$7 million, including the restoration of the Hart's Mill precinct, we're looking at the possibility of moving the fish market from North Arm to Port Adelaide along with other commercial and tourism developments. And this year is also one in which we hold the acclaimed Port Festival, which brings together the substantial creative and cultural aspects of our community.

There have been so many broken promises in past decades about reviving the Port, but in 2015 we can see change that really has now taken place, with more on the way.

As Elected Members, we have a strong moral obligation to do all we can for our community, to create and maintain jobs, and help built our economic and social fabric.

For the first time in years I sense that good things are happening in the Port; interest from investors has never been greater. The state government is working with us, and there are many opportunities waiting to be taken up, not the least of which is discussions around enhanced sporting facilities proposed for the eastern part of our council.

## **Key Decisions**

Your Elected Members meet every month to discuss a range of matters related to community life. Meetings are open to the public and everyone is welcome to attend. Here are just some of the key decisions made at recent meetings.

### **Meeting held 10 March:**

- Pedestrian ramp on the western side of Lipson Street, Port Adelaide, to be constructed.
- Allocation in the draft budget for a BBQ and alterations to an existing shade structure at Semaphore South Foreshore.
- Cr Jamieson nominated for position on the Dog and Cat Management Board.
- Proposed "Exeloo" public toilet within the Black Diamond Square precinct. The location to be considered during the redevelopment of the area in consultation with Renewal SA.
- Proposed naming of streets for Northgate Stage 14 continuation and Stage 19 (Neates Road, Wodli Street and Winta Way subject to final land division approval).

## **Meeting held 14 April:**

- A minute's silence was held for the upcoming 100th anniversary of Anzac Day and also in memory of former Charles Sturt Mayor Harold Anderson and former City of Enfield Councillor for North East Ward Colin Maas, who both passed away recently.
- The Kirkby Circuit Residents'
   Committee to be donated 100 litres
   of exterior paint. Council is to donate
   12 litres of paint per annum or such
   lesser amount as required for painting
   over vandalism attacks on the wall for
   a period of five years.
- \$240,000 proposed in the 2015-2016 financial year budget for construction of the Alberton Oval eastern flank mounding.
- Council to allocate funds in the next budget review to undertake a preliminary feasibility study into the establishment of a fish market in Port Adelaide.

## **100 YEARS AGO**

Reflecting on newspaper stories from our past

#### From father to son - A Soldier's Letter

Capt. Kayser, of the 12th. Battalion, Australian Imperial Forces, who was connected with the Alberton School, has written to his eight-year-old son. The letter will be read with interest by the hundreds of boys and girls he has taught. Capt. Kayser says: "I am going to tell you something about Egypt. We have been away from there for over a month now, and I can only tell you about the time we were there. We left Mena Camp at about 4 o'clock in the afternoon to march to Cairo, which was a 10-mile march. Well, off we went, with the band playing in front. Marching just behind me there was a sidedrummer, and on either side was a Scotch piper. These two Scotchmen are in my company, and they brought their beloved pipes all the way from South Australia. They make splendid music, and cheer us up when we are marching, and also keep us in step.

"We soon left the big old pyramids behind us, and at 6 o'clock we halted for tea. What do you think we had? Two very hard biscuits and a drink of water. After a smoke and a rest, off we went again in the moonlight.

"Between 8 and 9 o'clock we were nearing Cairo." You have to march over a big bridge, which has the statues of two big lions at the entrance. This big bridge is over the big River Nile. As we crossed the bridge we were all singing 'It's a long way to Tipperary.' Just across the bridge there is a big building, called the 'Kaser Nil' Barracks. A barracks is a big house with hundreds and thousands of rooms in it. In these rooms the soldiers live, and close by is a big open square where the soldiers drill. This is called the Barracks Square. In this barracks there are hundreds, yes even thousands, of English soldiers, and as we marched past singing at the top of our voices, they all put their heads out of the windows and joined in singing Tipperary. They cheered us and we cheered back. It was just grand, Ted, I can tell you.

"We marched into the Barracks Square and camped there for the night. We had no bunk so we just lay down in our great coats and slept on the hard ground. At 3 o'clock we were awakened. Very tired we all were, we got on board our train, which was now ready. The train took us to a port called Alexandria, where our ship was waiting to take us away from Egypt.

"Well I must stop for this time. Tell Miss Burnett and all the other teachers that I wish to be remembered to them, and all the boys and girls in the Alberton School as well!"

## The ABCDs of parenting



# A fascinating way to look at local history photos

We have now added relevant photographs owned by the State Library of South Australia to our Local History Flickr collection, accessible through Council's website. These additional images expand our online collection to over 3100 photos.

The images capture more than a century of history dating back to 1836. The collection includes a sketch of Colonel William Light exploring the Port River, and plenty of other images showcasing land marks, buildings and events from the late 19th century to the present day.

Using our Flickr page you can scroll through our complete collection or view them in categories of selected images as they are filed in albums including churches, hotels and significant people. You can view individual images in a larger format and then browse related images.

Council is keen to keep the site updated and dynamic, and welcomes any information you can give, simply by making a comment in the text box provided. Visit www.flickr.com/photos/paelocalhistory/sets/ to browse through the images. Our web application located at https://mapping.portenf. sa.gov.au/history/ allows you to view our historical photographs placed at the location they were taken, displayed on top of aerial maps from 1936, 1949, 1968 and 2010 together.

The aerial mapping tool enables you to view in fascinating detail the breadth of the city's urban sprawl and recent infrastructure renewal. The overlay of historic photographs provides a locational context and features some of the earliest known photos of the port, trade and business pioneers. These sites allow you to view and enjoy these elements of our local history.

## **End of an era for OPAL**

The OPAL program completes its five-year tenure in the City of Port Adelaide Enfield at the end of June this year.

Since its inception in 2010, the OPAL program has strived to improve the health and wellbeing of children and families in the community by covering a range of healthy eating and physical activity themes, including;

- Make it a fresh snack
- Think feet first: step, cycle, scoot to school
- A healthy brekky is easy as peel, pour, pop
- Life looks brighter outside

Overall, the OPAL program investment totalled \$1,195,000 in resources and resulted in a myriad of activities, some of which are listed below.

- More than 30,000 pieces of health promoting merchandise and 90,000 healthy eating and physical activity written resources distributed to families.
- More than 2000 children attended four different healthy eating/physical activity educational theatre shows.
- 1000 tomato seedlings were distributed to schoolchildren to promote home gardening.
- Over 200 staff and community members who work with families in the community were skilled in healthy eating and physical activity through various training sessions.
- More than 1000 community members were surveyed on what they would like to see in local parks and places.
- Eight park activation events were held, attended by more than 600 members of the community.
- The Shoot for the Moon community pedometer challenge had over 600 participants recording nearly 119 million steps.
- 12 Magic Harvest gardening programs were supported by at least 170 participants learning the basics of vegetable gardening.
- Six water fountains were installed in local parks.

The OPAL team, Laura Perdue and Shaun Li, would like to thank Council staff and community stakeholders for their assistance in delivering the program and helping to support children and families to eat well and be active.

## Honouring one of our own

A new interpretive historic sign was erected at Eric Sutton Reserve in time for Anzac Day this year.

Eric Sutton was born on 16 July, 1900, in Rosewater, married Winifried Grace Pocock at Rosewater in March 1930 and was a storekeeper before he enlisted for service in the Second World War.

Eric died in July 1943 on the notorious Thai Burma railway after he was captured following the fall of Singapore in 1942. He is buried at Thanbyzat War Cemetery in Burma. The Port Adelaide City Council decided to name the reserve after Eric Sutton at a Council meeting held on 4 September 1952.

The new sign shares more information about Eric's life and features his enlistment portrait.

Eric's daughter Judith Heidenreich and two nephews, Phil Heaton and Wes Saunders, visited the sign during April and were thrilled at this fitting tribute to one of our local heroes. Council is very proud of the local men and women who have represented our country. Centenary of Anzac services and events were extremely well attended across Council this year, continuing the memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

# **Lessons learnt at Re-energising seminar**

The Re-energising Port Adelaide Enfield community seminar supported by the City of Port Adelaide Enfield and the Department of Industry and Science on Tuesday 31 March was well attended by more than 40 guests.

Speakers included Heinz Werner Engel, Andy Chambers (SEED Consulting Services) and Port Adelaide Enfield Mayor Gary Johanson, who opened the evening.

Heinz's presentation on energy and resources in Bangladesh, Algeria and Europe provided a valuable insight into energy efficiency from an international prospective, and how "grass roots" eco-mapping methodology is leading change in Indonesia.

Andy Chambers provided a brief insight into the local Re-energising program and the success it is generating within the community. Lachlan Eddy, Assistant Manager of the Commonwealth Government Community Energy Efficiency Program, commended the seminar as being very well organised and attended.

The Re-energising Port Adelaide Enfield Community Program energy efficiency building upgrade works have now been commissioned in eight selected community buildings, with work at Portland Football Club recently completed with LED lighting, heating and insulation upgrades. Further upgrade works and the energy consumption benefits these activities will bring will take place in coming months.

The Re-energising program is dedicated to making a difference in reducing community building energy consumption through the use of technical upgrades and behavioural change education and awareness activities. Next time you upgrade your mobile, keep in mind the difference donating your old phone can make. Mobile Muster coordinated an 'Old Phones For Good Campaign' in December 2014 and January 2015, with \$2 per kilogram of mobiles and accessories collected donated to the Salvation Army.

The campaign resulted in a cheque for \$26,802 being presented to the Salvation Army Christmas Appeal, which helps families in need over Christmas by distributing toys, providing Christmas lunch, food vouchers and hampers. Recycling phones and accessories has an environmental benefit as mobile phones and accessories contain valuable resources that can be recycled and manufactured into new products.

## Kilburn Community Centre turns 50

Did you know that the first buildings that now form part of the Kilburn Community Centre were officially launched as a YMCA recreation centre in 1965?

For many years the Kilburn YMCA provided a range of recreational programs to the local community, including roller skating, badminton and movie nights. The stadium was augmented to include squash courts and a function hall across a number of expansions spanning many years.

When the Port Adelaide and Enfield councils amalgamated in 1996, the building officially became the Kilburn Community Centre. This decision was achieved largely as a result of the efforts of active local residents who saw the value of retaining the centre as a community resource. Thanks to their vision, the Kilburn Community Centre still stands today as a vital and vibrant local hub.

To celebrate the history and significance of Kilburn Community Centre, a 50th birthday event is planned for later this year. A date has not been set at this stage but it is likely to be in September. Planning for this milestone event has already begun. Local resident Betty Dobson helped to spark interest in the idea of a 50th birthday celebration by presenting her original invitation to the launch of the YMCA building in 1965. # The Parks and The Port: new development policies

The Minister for Planning has updated some of the development policies and zone boundaries at Port Adelaide, Angle Park, and Mansfield Park (The Parks). For Port Adelaide, the fertiliser storage facility for Incitec Pivot has been rezoned from the Industry Zone to the Light Industry Zone. This is associated with the intended relocation of Incitec Pivot, and is aimed at enabling new mixed use developments in the vicinity of Dock One and the Port River Expressway.

The Minister has also changed the allowable maximum building heights in various parts of the Port Adelaide Centre Zone and the waterfront. Some areas now allow for increased heights, but others will have a decreased maximum height.

For The Parks, the northern portion of the former Parks Community Centre has been rezoned to the Residential Zone. The rezoned area will allow for a future medium-density residential estate. There are new policies to guide the development of the future community centre and library. If you are interested in learning more, please contact Council, hop onto our website or seek further information from the Minister.

## **Funding grants coming soon**

Does your community group or organisation need funds? Do you have a brilliant idea for a community project? Our Community and Cultural Development Grants may be able to assist.

Council's community grants program is an essential community development tool that supports programs and projects that promote active community participation and enhance the health and wellbeing of our community.

The grants program can help with project funding for activities that initiate and support partnerships in the local community, bringing people together to share skills, talents, knowledge and experiences and thereby strengthening our local community and enhancing the quality of community life.

Eligible organisations or community groups can apply for up to \$5000 for projects, programs or activities with a community development outcome, or for up to \$2000 for minor capital works or the purchase of equipment.

Past successful projects include computer classes for seniors, English language classes for new arrivals, a cultural exchange program built around food and family, money management for people with mild intellectual disabilities, community gardening, the purchase of educational toys and community arts projects.

Applications will open on Monday 13 July and close at 5pm Thursday 27 August. Eligibility and funding criteria apply to all Council's grants programs. All applications should be discussed with Council's Grants & Events Officer prior to any submission.



## How to pay your rates

Council rates can be paid in full or in four quarterly instalments in September, December, March and June each year. Payments can be made via Council's website, by telephone, via your participating bank, B-PAY, Australia Post, by mail or in person at Council Offices.

Full payment options are detailed on your rates notice and accounts will be sent at least 30 days before each instalment falls due. Ratepayers who are in arrears are encouraged to get in touch with the Council to arrange a flexible approach to debt recovery, and often payment arrangements can be negotiated. Any rate instalment that is not paid on or before the due date is regarded as being in arrears and a fine of 2% of the amount of the instalment is payable. A further penalty at the prescribed interest rate is added to any unpaid rates for every month they continue to be unpaid. To help alert residents about unpaid rates, Council issues a Notice of Overdue Rates after the instalment is due and remains unpaid. Contact Council if you have any concerns regarding your rates payment.

If Council does not receive a response to the quarterly rate notices, notice of overdue rates and other communications, the matter will be placed in the hands of Council's debt collection agency which may lead to court action to recover the debt, which will lead to additional costs.

If you are experiencing difficulty in meeting the due payment dates, please contact Council on 8405 6600 to discuss a possible alternative payment arrangement. All such arrangements are strictly confidential.

Council ensures that each ratepayer is treated equally and fairly, and will always try to work with you to resolve rates arrears within Council guidelines and procedures.

## Celebrating Navy's role in WWI

An exhibition at the South Australian Maritime Museum is commemorating the history of World War 1 at sea and at home. Gallipoli is a household name and the tragedy and exploits of the Australian Army are legendary. Less well known is the role of the Australian Navy and in many fields it was first in and last out. On the eve of the Gallipoli campaign, Australia's submarine AE2 penetrated the Dardanelles Straits diving under fire from shore batteries and ships to reach the Sea of Marmara and attack enemy shipping.

The Maritime Museum has brought together an extraordinary collection of artefacts from local and national collections, including objects from the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, and the Australian Navy's heritage collection. 

She has had a strong involvement with the local community all her life and is committed to using her studies to assist in further advocating for her people.

Nicolas is in the second year of a Bachelor of Dental Surgery. Nic has demonstrated his desire to not only gain qualifications but also to support the integration of Indigenous Cultural Competencies within the curriculum and to provide input into issues surrounding Indigenous oral health. He hopes to inspire the next generation of Indigenous dentists.

The Scholarships were presented to Susan and Nicolas by Mayor Gary Johanson at the Council meeting held on 12 May 2015.
