SEMAPHORE WARD



The Semaphore Ward has the huge advantage of having two wide main street boulevards, in Semaphore Road and Jetty Road. One of my favourite places, along with many locals and visitors, is the Semaphore grassed median strip, as in summer it fills up with families eating fish and chips. While Jetty Road is more low key, it is undergoing a quiet redevelopment, with a range of quirky shops alongside the grand Largs Pier Hotel.

I particularly love the continuous walking path from Outer Harbor to Semaphore South, with a raised portion from Taperoo to Largs Bay, which helps to protect our amazing dunes. This path is well used by families and sporting enthusiasts, either running, walking or biking.

I have also chosen the beach at the Largs Bay Sailing Club because they are hosting 2 major Youth Regattas – the first from 2-9 January for Optimist's followed by the International Cadet Australian Championship Regatta from II-19 January 2017. This will showcase this fantastic area and surrounding suburbs.

Largs Bay beach, along with Semaphore, are where our newly trialled beach access mats will be positioned next summer. These mats will enable everyone from people with disabilities, to the young or old to access the sand and water if they choose to. The council is also undergoing community consultation in relation to new accessible adult changing room facilities for people with disabilities, to be placed in close proximity to the beach access mats. This is very exciting news for our residents and our coastal tourism.

I also must mention the Port River with its abundance of marine life, especially our magical dolphins that seem to appear everywhere.

LANGUAGE REGISTER

Did you know that within our richly multicultural region, more than 6% of our population don't speak English and 22% speak a language other than English at home.

We think this is a wonderful reflection of our diversity, however we recognise it can pose a barrier to some people who want to access or understand Council services or seek assistance from Council staff. So to help improve our communication with our community, we've developed a register of staff at the Civic Centre and Libraries who speak a second language.

In total, Council employs 41 members of staff who collectively speak 25 languages other than English, including sign language. A staff translator can assist with phone calls, with written communication or at the front counter.

Appointments should be booked through our Customer Service team. Where required, Council also utilises an external translating and interpretation service, which is available both for phone calls and face-to-face conversations. This service can be pre-booked on their website at www.tisnational.gov.au.

ABORIGINAL ADVISORY PANEL

We are seeking nominations for membership of the City of Port Adelaide Enfield Aboriginal Advisory Panel.

The Panel is a highly respected body that acts as a conduit between the Council and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. It provides members with an opportunity to have a voice in policy and raise awareness of current community issues.

To be eligible to join the Panel you must be an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person living, working or having a strong connection with the City of Port Adelaide Enfield area, or represent an organisation whose primary role is to provide services for persons of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent.

Priority for appointment to the Panel will be given to those nominees who are of Kaurna descent.

THE PORT

A young woman, pale-faced, bare-footed in a rag-like dress wanders aimlessly along Lipson Street. A wide-eyed forlorn look - she draws concerned glances from passers-by as she anxiously wrings her hands. Some even approach her to ask after her welfare.

She assures them she's ok. They eventually realise this young woman is from another time; one of many 'characters' authentically brought to life for Port Adelaide's Festival of Vintage: Boats, Trains and Planes.

On Saturday October 15, the sun made a rare but welcome Spring appearance for day one of the Festival. And the crowds responded. Saturday's attendance swelled into the thousands.

Lipson Street was transformed into a vintage-style catwalk for roving 'characters' from the past, a brass band and performers on stilts. Period furniture, a photo booth, puppet shows and emporium markets lined the footpaths and swirling food van aromas filled the air. There were camel rides on McLaren Wharf beside the tall ship Tenacious, visiting from the UK as part of an 8-month Australian adventure. More than 1000 people toured her over the weekend, as well as dozens of members of the public who kindly volunteered their time to be "on-board guides."

Falie, One and All and the Port's grand old-lady, City of Adelaide Clipper Ship, were also open for tours. A double-decker bus transported festival-goers between the Maritime, Aviation and Railway Museums, which each put on a special program of events including boat-building demonstrations, sail-making, blacksmithing and coopering and vintage plane fly-overs. A 1919 steam locomotive chuffed passengers between the Railway and Aviation Museums, while 1950s Red Hen trains ran people to the Port from Adelaide.

Hart's Mill came alive with a magnificent collection of classic motorbikes on display, which attracted hundreds of enthusiasts over the weekend.

Festival of Vintage: Boats, Planes and Trains was organised by the City of PAE in collaboration with each of the Museums and the Classic Owners Motorcycle Club Inc.

The Roy Marten Dog Park at Taperoo is open for business and from feedback received so far, it appears our attendees have been having a howlin' good time!



GHOSTS OF THE PORT

Established in 1836 as the state's primary maritime centre, there are many thousands of fascinating and often tragic stories about the people who have lived, worked and died in the Port Adelaide area. These stories contribute to the rich fabric of our community and a selection are shared within this resource in a way that is designed to evoke the history and mystery of the Port.

This year, for Halloween, the Council commissioned the development of a self-guided walking tour 'Ghosts of the Port', researched and written by Allen Tiller.

Mr Tiller is the star of Syfy's hit TV show, Haunting: Australia.

The guide includes a detailed history of 13 different historic locations across the Port, including the Civic precinct, local pubs, Lipson Street, the Lighthouse and more.

BOOK LAUNCH ON FORGOTTEN LOCAL HISTORY

As a senior secondary teacher for 31 years, Michael Wohltmann dedicated much of his career to the fields of Modern European History, Australian History and International and Australian Politics.

From this was borne his interest in a little known, but significant part of local history – the internment of "enemy German aliens" in a camp on Torrens Island from 1914 -1924.

How could it be that German-Australians, who were positively viewed as zealous, hard working and model citizens prior to the Great War, by May 1915, were viewed as outcasts within their own country?


450 people were placed in this camp when the Great War broke out and it has been reported that Torrens Island Concentration Camp was the worst of all internment camps.

"I have been interested in Torrens Island Concentration Camp since the eighties," Mr Wohltmann said.

"What interested me most is why some historical events in our past are not recognised, remembered, conveniently forgotten or even erased from our collective memory."

He is also interested in how internment impacted on the German-Australian community, both during the Great War and after the war.

A Future Unlived: A history of the internment of German Enemy Aliens on Torrens Island in South Australia during 1914-1924 is an indepth account of what went on. Mr Wohltmann launched his book to a sold-out crowd at the Port Adelaide Library in October.



GALLIPOLI RE-ENACTMENT GETS LOCAL FILMMAKER A NATIONAL NOD

When local filmmaker Alison Rogers was approached to create a re-enactment of the landing at Gallipoli for last year's 100th anniversary, she was determined to overcome a range of challenges and do justice to the incredibly important war-time story.

The Port Adelaide and Semaphore RSL spear-headed the project with an extraordinarily tight budget and requested that the re-enactment happen on Semaphore Beach.

Her Gallipoli scene was set in the water at Semaphore, with soldiers heading towards shore in wooden boats, expressing their fears and experiences of the landing. The end result is a poignant and emotive account of that day.

The film was accepted into the Veteran's Film Festival – held at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra on the 14th and 15th of October 2016.

Alison said, "It was a lovely surprise to find that the film had been accepted into the film festival. There are so many high calibre films playing. I'm really proud of what we achieved with the Semaphore and Port Adelaide RSL and the students at Alberton Primary School as well as the volunteers who acted in the film. It was a community effort."

"It's a real honour that 'ANZAC Letters' was screened at the Australian War Memorial as part of the Veterans Film Festival, it's such an incredible venue."

will well and truly be out to the rest of the state, the nation and the world.

That's thanks to successful bids by Largs Bay Sailing Club (LBSC) to host two youth sailing regattas - the Gill Australian & Open Optimist Championships (2nd to 9th January, 2017) and the Breeze Air by Seeley International 55th International Cadet Australian Championship Regatta (11th to 19th January, 2017). "We were able to win them both, which is huge," said the LBSC's Optimist Event Coordinator, Kylie Baker.

"We are expecting around 1500 people to come through per day and we expect a lot of them to go out on the water each day, so we're working in partnership with the Cruising Yacht Club of South Australia and their facilities. And the One and All will do a day sail to come out on the course which is great." Michael Simms, LBSC President said, "It's a pretty significant event in SA. All of these only come to each state every 7 years."

There'll be approximately 440 competitors across the two events and entrants have already registered from interstate as well as Thailand, the United States, New Zealand and Dubai. It promises to be a major tourism and economic boon for our region.

"When this competition was held on the Mornington Peninsula a few years back, their revenue was \$3 million - and they're a similar area to what we are," said Kylie.

The City of PAE has sponsored the Largs Bay Sailing Club with a \$25,000 major event grant.

LBSC Commodore Matthew Carter said, "Events like this are also heavily reliant on the dedication of volunteers - and we'll have more than 100 people helping to ensure things run smoothly on and off the water."

There'll also be a third regatta event, the Australian 29er and 49er Championships at the Royal South Australian Yacht Squadron at Outer Harbor from 2nd - 8th January.

Australian Sailing spokesperson lan Leeson says, "It will really showcase the sport in this area and shows the general public that sailing is a viable option to get involved with."

SENIORS GROUPS

One of the the City of Port Adelaide Enfield's City Plan 2030 priorities is Community - with a focus on ways to promote wellbeing through social inclusion. "We love to get out and about with excursions almost weekly. We enjoy mystery bus trips and social outings to various industries and areas of SA," said Secretary David Ireland.



MEMORIAL PLAQUE ON **BIRKENHEAD BRIDGE**

It was August 22, 1978 - Geoffrey Martin was driving across the Birkenhead Bridge when he was involved in a crash with a petrol tanker and his car burst into flames. Mr Martin was killed and the tragedy unfolded before dozens of horrified witnesses.

Ever since, Mr Martin's widow Elaine Peddey, has lobbied passionately for change, which has seen heavy vehicles banned from the Birkenhead Bridge.

And in October – just over 38 years since his death, Elaine succeeded in having a memorial plaque to her late husband unveiled on the newly renovated bridge.

Infrastructure Minister Stephen Mullighan officially 'opened' the revamped bridge - commending local company AFL Services for undertaking the complex and major works.

Clutching photos of Mr Martin and supported by her family, Elaine spoke passionately about her late husband.

She has provided us with the following statement to express how much the plaque means to her and her family:

"This plaque represents for me an official recognition, that even in dying, Geoff, aged 31 years, gave a gift to the community by creating a safer environment as fuel tankers were redirected out of Pt. Adelaide.

In honouring Geoff, we remember everybody present that night on the bridge. Family, friends, the local community and emergency services. We all have a horrific memory never to be forgotten. Besides family and friends present at the unveiling, were Geoff's much loved Scouts/Venturers of Taperoo Sea Scouts of 1978, a policeman, a fireman and the tanker driver. I also acknowledge my husband Greg, who has supported me every step of the way to achieve this goal."

Mayor Gary Johanson said, "It's wonderful to at last see the life of a clearly much-loved local man immortalised on the bridge. Mrs Peddey and her family have endured a terrible tragedy - but her passion and dedication have resulted in a safer environment on our roads.

"I congratulate and thank Mrs Peddey for her efforts. "I would also like to commend local business AFL Services for their highly-professional work in restoring this bridge.'



KILBURN KARAOKE

RECONCILIATION RELAY

As part of our Nunga Week celebrations, 25 schools across the City of PAE took part in the 2016 Reconciliation Relay which went from 3 to 11 November. It is an amazing event with over 8,000 children being involved in one way or another.

Imagine a group of students and staff from one school walking into another school making as much noise as they can, singing and using clapsticks to announce their arrival. They are met by students from the second school who, with much celebration, take over custody of an Aboriginal message stick and message box.

That school then has half a day to make some form of contribution to the message box which represents the school's thoughts on reconciliation before they, in turn, visit the next school to hand them over.

The Relay ended with an event organised by council in partnership with Reconciliation Action Committee, at Enfield Community Centre on the 11th November. The work produced by the schools will be shown at an exhibition to be held early in 2017.

HOME SUPPORT VANS

The Council has five Home Support Vans which operate daily throughout the week to various locations in the community. This service wouldn't be possible without dedicated volunteers like David Archdall from Alberton.

David has been a volunteer driver with Council for two years and he loves the contact with the community.

"It's really good talking with people in the van - you hear their life story and get a tremendous sense of appreciation from them," he said.

Vans pick up residents and drop them at pre-organised events such as community groups and social clubs run by the Community Services team. They also offer a door-to-door shopping service for residents registered with council who have been assessed as suitable for the service. Transport is available to residents who have difficulty catching public transport. (Council also operates community bus circuits which anybody can use).

One elderly resident told us she's been using Council's Community Services for 25 years.

"If I didn't have the vans I wouldn't be able to go out or I'd have to use a taxi which would be difficult," she said.

"The shopping trips are great and the drivers help me by picking me up from my door and taking me right to the shops, plus they love to chat"

She is a regular at social groups run through Council's Community Services team.

"I love the company and conversation. If I didn't come here I would be stuck at home"

A number of vans have hoists fitted to enable access for wheelchairs and clients who have difficulty getting up and down the steps.

ADDITIONAL COMPOSTABLE BAGS NOW AVAILABLE

If you think your roll of compostable bags won't last until the next annual delivery, you can now purchase an additional roll of 150 bags for \$10. The bags will be delivered to your home by Cleanaway, and can be ordered by phoning the Waste Line free call 1800 777 844.

Council will still deliver a free roll of 150 bags to all residential properties in March/April 2017.

Please remember that only compostable bags go in your large green lid wheelie bin - no plastic or biodegradable bags please! This is really important as plastic and biodegradable bags do not compost.

Alternatively food scraps can be wrapped in newspaper or paper towel, or placed loose in the green lid bin.

This is an initiative of the City of Port Adelaide Enfield.

NO COFFEE CUPS PLEASE: PINK BIN PILOT SCHEME

In August 2016, City of Port Adelaide Enfield installed a number of pink lid recycling bins designated for refundable cans and bottles, as a part of a 6 months trial on Semaphore foreshore. We selected pink to ensure the bins stand-out as much as possible.

Initial reports are, the trial has been working well, with a noticeable reduction in litter.

Other benefits of the pink bins include a reduction in carbon emissions as additional trucks are not required for disposal, plus less litter means a safer environment for our community.

But - We need your help! Takeaway coffee cups are not suitable for these bins and so far have been a main source of contamination.

Please only dispose of cans and bottles in the pink bins.

Depending on the final outcome of the trial, the scheme could roll-out to other sites within the City of PAE. Neighbouring councils are also keenly watching the program and its outcomes. Tell us what you think by emailing customer.service@portenf.

INNOVATION IN STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

Stormwater management is an ongoing challenge and priority for the City of Port Adelaide Enfield. Due to our geographic positioning and proximity to the sea, stormwater from across Adelaide passes through our region every time there is heavy rain. In fact, 85% of the run-off which passes through some of our channels comes from other council areas.

As part of the Council's Stormwater Management Plan, we recently employed the services of UniSA to investigate the relationship between culverts and water flow. Culverts are an essential infrastructure component used to provide extra strength where water is channelled underneath road crossings.

The challenge is where culverts slow the flow of water in heavy rainfall and can act like a dam, causing a build-up and affecting the entire system.

UniSA created a to-scale culvert model and used computer modelling software to test various methods of improving water flow and to help achieve cost savings in our stormwater flood mitigation strategies.

The Stormwater Management Plan has been developed in line with City Plan 2030's Environment Objective – to maintain and sustain our natural environment. It reflects modern thinking in regards to stormwater management and stands to have a huge impact on alleviating levels of flooding in surrounding catchments.

DISPOSE OF YOUR PAINT WASTE AND PACKAGING

Paintback is an industry initiative to divert paint waste and packaging away from landfill. Residents and trade painters can now dispose of their waste at no additional cost at Paintback collection points.

Paintback is aiming to expand to over 70 sites across Australia over the next 3 years, and collect over 45,000 tonnes of paint within 5 years.

MEET THE BUYER

Meet the Buyer events are gatherings of local industry and government to establish networks that will increase local business participation in state and local government supply contracts.

The City of PAE has been actively working with the Office of Industry Advocate to promote this and three Meet the Buyer events have been held in the northern region in 2016. In October over 300 businesses were hosted at the Port Adelaide Football Club, where they met with representatives from most government departments, local councils, and the Northern Connector team.

Those attending the Meet the Buyer event were updated on the South Australian Industry Participation Policy (IPP). The policy specifies that for all expenditure above \$220,000, the government must first determine if there is a business in the state or the region that can deliver the product or service, before looking interstate or overseas.

To increase the opportunity for northern businesses, the State Government has recently increased the weighting it places on local jobs when awarding tenders in northern Adelaide to a minimum of 20%. The new rules will apply to major projects including the Northern Connector Expressway, the Food Park, school and public housing upgrades and the Gawler East Collector Link Road.

The City of PAE's most recent analysis of data shows almost 30% of our orders placed for goods and services are with businesses based in the Port Adelaide Enfield area, and overall, 90% with South Australian businesses.

LOOK NORTH

Look North is the branding and promotional tool of the Northern Economic Plan which has been developed by the State Government in collaboration with the Cities of Port Adelaide Enfield, Salisbury and Playford. An essential pillar of the Northern Economic Plan is to stimulate new business activity and seed growth strategies for

northern Adelaide businesses that employ less than 20 fulltime equivalent employees. The Small Business Development Fund was established by the Plan with an allocation of \$10 million to support business

allocation of \$10 million to support busines start-up and existing business expansion.

Congratulations to those businesses within the City of PAE that have successfully applied for expansion grants, including Bowe Pty Ltd, Castech and Prospect Rd Day Night Clinic to name just a few. The funds will be used to expand the businesses and to create new employment opportunities in the region.
