KEYS TO THE CITY OF PAE

Master Locksmith Access Keys (MLAK) is a security system that enables people with disabilities to gain 24/7 access to a network of public facilities in shopping centres, museums, playgrounds and public spaces all across Australia.

The City of PAE is now using MLAK keys to secure toilet facilities at Semaphore and the Parks libraries. You can apply for your own key by visiting the Master Locksmiths Association of Australia web page and completing the application form www.masterlocksmiths.com.au/mlak.php

MLAK keys cost \$20 including GST and applications will need to be validated.

Eligibility is restricted to people who have a disability or have written authority from:

- a doctor
- a disability organisation
- community health centre
- the owner or management of a building with an accessible toilet on site

If you do not have your own key there will be a notice posted at each facility to let you know where you can borrow one.

WE'RE CHANGING PLACES

Our Parks Library has the first accredited Changing Places in South Australia. With an adult change table, a tracking hoist system, peninsula toilet and privacy curtain, this space helps individuals and their carers to participate in the social life of our community. The Changing Places also features a nature-inspired ceiling design in colours which are both calming and soothing. The facility is accessible using a MLAK key and a key is also available from the Customer Service Desk at the library.

Without the features of a Changing Places toilet, the standard accessible toilet is not functional and therefore many people with a disability and their carers are left with the options of staying home, leaving the library prematurely or having to be changed on the floor of a public toilet.

HOME BASED FOOD BUSINESS

Under the law, there are food hygiene standards that need to be upheld. It is important to notify us about any food businesses operating from home so that our Environmental Health Officers can ensure the safety of consumers and reduce the risk of food poisoning.

Many people may not be aware of this regulations, however, for public safety, it is important that all food businesses comply with the requirements of the Food Act and Food Safety Standards.

Complainants will not be in trouble if they report an unauthorised home based food business. One of our Environmental Health Officers will investigate and work with operators to ensure that the Food Act is followed and any risks to public health are reduced.

NEIGHBOURS MAKE THE WORLD OF DIFFERENCE

Lorraine Strain has been a resident of Port Adelaide Enfield for all of her life. She has seen a good deal of change in her area, but always recognised the importance of staying connected to local people. Lorraine and her neighbours have been able to provide reciprocal support in a number of ways, especially helping each other out in times of illness or stress.

Australians are increasingly time poor, with many households having all adults in employment, and less time for community engagement and neighbourhood connection. Fewer people know and interact with their neighbours and are members of community groups. The circle of people we feel we can turn to when we need a hand, or a shoulder to cry on is shrinking in all age groups. But there are lots of ways that each one of us can build bonds that improve the quality of life for everyone in our community.

A recent project to tell the stories of some of our best community builders has led to the production of a series of short films which were launched at the Port Fringe event. To recognise Neighbour Day 2019, why not consider:

- hosting a get-together with your neighbours – and we'll kick-in \$50 toward refreshments or other costs.
- showing your appreciation for a neighbour. Tell us in 300 words or less what you appreciate about a neighbour. We have 10 gift baskets for SA produce (valued at \$100 each) to give away.

RETIRED? PLANNING TO RETIRE?

Ever thought about when you might like to retire or what you'll do with the 2000+ extra hours a year when you retire? Are you clear about what you want from retirement, or dreading it and stuck for ideas? Maybe your circumstances have changed and your retirement plans will need to change too.

While most of us plan for our financial future in retirement, we often struggle to describe what we want to do in retirement. Or our retirement doesn't quite go to plan, or isn't as fulfilling as we'd dreamed about.

In a first for South Australia, the City of PAE has partnered with local residents and others to develop two programs which provide people with the tools and guidance to plan a better retirement, or change it up if it isn't working for them.

Mindset for Life is a peer-led personal development program for people who have retired and are wondering what's next. It's designed to provide an opportunity to reflect on your journey and work out what retirement looks like for you, while helping others do the same. The program comprises of an introductory session, and for those who wish to continue two 4 hour sessions.

Plan Your Ultimate Retirement is designed for people who think retirement is on their radar in the next one to five years. It's designed to get you thinking and preparing for what you might want from retirement, and how best to make that transition.

The program is 12 hours in total delivered over two weekends (a fortnight apart), with some preparation and take-home activities. You'll come away with a greater sense of your skills, abilities and priorities, a vision for your future and an achievable plan to get you moving in your chosen direction.

AUSTRALIA DAY AWARDS

The winners of the 2019 City of Port Adelaide Enfield Australia Day Awards were announced at a ceremony at Parks Library on 25 January.

These prestigious Awards celebrate the exceptional people and groups who have made an outstanding contribution in their community. Mayor Claire Boan presented the Awards, congratulating all the nominees and winners and acknowledging their contribution to making our community a better place to be.

2019 Australia Day Award Winners

Citizen of the Year – Alexandra Vakitsidis

For 40 years Alexandra has consistently contributed to the Port Adelaide community through her volunteering, fundraising and leadership roles in multiple committees. Alexandra is able to motivate not only other volunteers but also the general public to rally, help and support good causes. She works tirelessly each week to look after the aged and vulnerable through home visits, fundraising and weekly luncheons. Alexandra is also involved in the wider Greek community organising fundraising events, visiting nursing homes to entertain and look into the welfare of community members. For the last five years Alexandra has headed the Port Adelaide Philanthropic Society where she has raised money to donate to hospitals for research.

Young Citizen of the Year – Matakey Mersha

Matakey was nominated in recognition of his significant contribution to supporting young people in the local Ethiopian & Eritrean Communities. For years Matakey has been organizing boys' soccer teams and this year he helped establish the Horn of Africa girls' soccer team. Matakey does this out of kindness and is always there for the younger community. He has created a place where people feel like they belong.

Community Event of the Year – Semaphore Greek Festival

The Semaphore Greek Festival attracts people from all cultures and age groups. The event attracts over forty thousand visitors over a two day weekend. It includes over three hundred volunteers from the community. The festival offers visitors the opportunity to immerse themselves in the full cultural aspect by way of food, beverages, sweets, music, dancing and entertainment. From its humble beginnings of seven hundred patrons to now tens of thousands swarming the foreshore, the festival is known for its reputation for high quality food and sweets.

Emerging Event/Community Group of the year – The Experience Café

The Experience Café began operating at Kilburn Community Centre one year ago. It has become a hub of community, offering people not just economical meals and great coffee but a place to meet and a welcoming space for people looking for social connections. Experience Café trains volunteers and allows them to gain experience working in a café environment, providing pathways to employment and mentoring for members of the community. A number of local residents who were previously isolated feel comfortable to come to the café for support and a place to be. The Experience Café has made a significant impact on Kilburn Community Centre. Diners at the Café feel they are part of the family.

CHURCH SCULPTURE TO PAY RESPECTS TO KAURNA PEOPLE

With a desire to acknowledge the traditional owners of the land their church sits on, members of the Enfield Uniting Church called on the local community and Council's Aboriginal Advisory Panel.

A popular, but neglected, public walkway next to the church at 247 Main North Road was chosen to develop into an inviting green space for passers-by that also showed the commitment to growing living relationships between First and Second peoples in our local area.

During early conversations and investigations by the SA Museum, it was discovered that the site had been the intersection of major Kaurna trading routes and could well have been a gathering place of indigenous peoples for many generations.

Horticulture students from Tauondi Aboriginal College, led by teacher Michelle Noronha, also became involved by selecting suitable plants and designing the site.

Margaret Gunn from the Uniting Church said that she hoped passers-by would notice the striking screens, particularly at night when they are floodlit to contrast with the Main North Road business frontages.

"Most of all, we hope people passing by will stop and think about the Kaurna people of the Adelaide Plains by seeing this positive commitment to growing relationships today," she added.

\$22,000 was funded by the Enfield Uniting Church congregation, anonymous donors and the Uniting Foundation, and the City of PAE provided advice, and \$2,500 Community Grant for flood lights, security, additional seating and garden features.

BUILDING AN INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY

Work is being undertaken on our Inclusive Communities Plan which provides an integrated, whole-of-Council approach and commitment to strengthen inclusion and access for all.

The new Disability Inclusion Act 2018 requires us to have a plan which needs to include strategies to support people with disabilities in the following areas:

- Access to built environs, events and facilities
- Access to information and communications
- Addressing the specific needs of people with disability in its programs and services
- Employment

The Plan will have reporting requirements to the State Government on a regular basis. At the moment we are reviewing the feedback received during our first round of consultation. During Autumn we will be running further engagement about the plan, and will be inviting feedback from the community about the work we have done so far. The Lights Community and Sports Centre is a world class indoor facility being built by the City of PAE in Lightsview, with a focus on access and inclusion. The outside of the structure is almost complete and work on the inside is well underway.

Inside there will be a café and commercial area, multiple accessible changing areas, meeting rooms and offices. The five courts can be used for basketball, netball, badminton or pretty much any other indoor sport you can imagine. Together can be used as a performance space or a community area for larger functions.

There are large windows throughout the entire building, so you don't miss any of the action, and a mezzanine level to give you a bird's eye view of the courts. Upstairs, overlooking the courts, are large, flexible community areas. Bright, spacious communal areas and hallways ensure plenty of room to move around.

The two showcase courts can be used for everything from grassroots to international elite competition. They will include the first smart court technology installed in South Australia, with a system of 4k cameras that allows livestreaming, tracking technology and broadcast that can be used for instant play analysis, virtual whiteboards and highlight reels. The floor surface is superior quality hard maple which is the choice of 29 NBA teams and the Australian Institute of Sport.

Neighbours volunteer their time to facilitate workshops and share their knowledge and skills in different topics. The street party, with live music and stalls, marked one year since the opening of The Pear, but more importantly it marked one year of neighbourliness; of looking out for each other.

URBAN PLANNING CHANGES ON THE HORIZON

If you've ever built a carport, subdivided land, or formally commented on a development application, you have dealt with the urban planning system.

Controlled by state legislation, the State Parliament has passed new legislation to overhaul the entire planning system after 25 years.

The new legislation is called the Planning, Development and Infrastructure Act 2016. It is being rolled out over the next 18 months, and will change the way that development is conducted in the Council area (and the whole state).

The State Government has created the State Planning Portal, to explain the features of the new system. It also discusses the public consultation that will be conducted on the new system, which will occur during 2019 and 2020. You can access the Portal here www.saplanningportal.sa.gov.au/

The consultation process gives local residents and business owners the opportunity to comment on new planning policies and processes. This may relate to things like the zoning of land, heritage protection, maximum building heights, and residential character.

Council has taken part in the consultation process so far, and will continue to do so in the future. You can find our submissions on our website. Residents and businesses are encouraged to make their views known to the State Government as well.

The next step in the consultation is the release of discussion papers on urban design and neighbourhood character.

OUR LIVING LANDSCAPES

In late November 2018, the Australian nature writing Inga Simpson (author of *Nest*, *Mr Wigg*, *Where the Trees Are* and *Understory*) held a nature writing masterclass at Gallery Yampu and a meet the author event at the Parks Library.

Inga's visit was held as part of our Living Landscape Initiative, a foundation project of the Living Environment Strategy 2022. The initiative promotes the value and living history of the city's built, cultural and natural heritage. WRITING NATURE IN PORT ADELAIDE – INGA SIMPSON

It is already hot when we gather at Gallery Yampu, the perfect setting for a nature writing workshop. Yampu is the Kurna word for dolphin, and this creative space offers us expansive views of the river and Port Adelaide's historic buildings. One writer spots a dolphin by the bridge on his way in.

I find it humbling hearing the participant's words, as they share their responses to the writing exercises – tentative at first but gaining confidence as the day goes on. I see the port through their eyes, taking on the issues facing their local environments. These emerging stories are central to place-making: embracing the past, rewriting the future.

At morning tea we lean on the deck railing and stare at a single mangrove, fighting back. Someone points out a well-camouflaged crab, and then we see the fingerlings in the shallows. Nature writing is ninety per cent observation, but it requires being still, opening ourselves to the landscape.

When I visit Mutton Cove Conservation Reserve the next day, it is hard to tear my eyes from the power station, to look past the refuse, the muck snagged on the undergrowth left behind by the tide. Even though I spotted the arching backs of dolphins within moments of emerging from the air-conditioned car, I'm struggling to be in this place in my usual way, to enter the landscape. When Maggie asks what I see, I say, 'A wasteland.'

It isn't until I see the stilts that the blinkers come off. We're here for the birdwatching, with Tony Flaherty from the local NRM office. I've never seen pied stilts. Their black and white bodies atop long pinky-red legs seem so improbable – yet graceful.

There are so many shore birds I lose count: spoonbills, white-faced herons, ibis, oyster catchers, dotterel, plovers, terns and gulls, godwits, shanks, dowitcher and more. This is part of the east Asian-Australasian flyway, a critical habitat for migratory species from as far away as Siberia. I'm transfixed with Tony's tales of tracking of individuals and pairs, their stories. Some of these birds have just landed, and have a long way to go yet.

It is a small crowd that evening at the Parks Library, but some have travelled for ninety minutes. While we are discussing the importance of reconciling our First Nations histories with any story of place, a storm moves in, the wind swirling dust around outside. It is as if the land has spoken.

On my final morning, we head out to Garden Island with Dr Mike Bossley. Conditions aren't right for a boat tour of the Dolphin Sanctuary but we walk along the boardwalk. The dolphins do not reveal themselves but it is another bird watching opportunity, and an up-close close look at the mangroves and waterways.

I finish with a visit to the Maritime Museum, grounding my experiences in the port's history, and recognising Mike's voice on the video that is part the dolphin exhibit. It seems appropriate that the dolphins should have the last word. After an intense few days of wonderful conversations with passionate people about the arts and environment, I leave with the embrace of a warm and creative community unlike any that I have experienced. My thanks to the Port Adelaide Enfield Council for hosting me.

MANGROVE'S ALIVE

Dr Zoe Doubleday is a Marine Biologist from the Future Industries Institute at the University of South Australia, who has a love for our local mangroves. She can often be found in the area collecting samples for research.

The area, popular with kayakers and weekend adventurers, is thriving with marine life from large dolphins to microscopic creatures, all of which form part of this vital natural ecosystem. There is one coldwater species of mangroves in Australia and they only occur in a few locations. It is very special to have these so close to the city.

They take up a small area but provide an immense benefit, as Dr Doubleday describes, "Mangroves and sediments around the roots suck up a huge amount of carbon and really contribute to clean air and clear purified water, they also protect the coast from storm surges in a similar way to dunes along the beach"

A hidden secret in the City of PAE, the mangroves are "Like a remnant of a beautiful environment that is highly biodiverse but is surrounded by industrial land."

It is important to raise awareness and understanding that they are a fragile environment that need to be preserved, "Mangroves are not a wasteland, they are forests of the sea and a precious resource that we can also enjoy because of all the life that thrives in them."

The City of PAE partners with others to run clean-ups in the area, and the Living Landscapes Initiative, which supports the community to increase the community understanding around the importance of these natural environments and their conservation.
