

TIME TO CHECK YOUR DOG AND CAT REGISTRATION

Annual dog registration renewal notices will be sent to all dog owners during the first week of July. Following the launch of the Statewide Dogs and Cats Online (DACO) database last year, owners can now choose to receive their renewals by SMS, email or post.

Renewal notice preferences can be updated via the website www.dogsandcatsonline.com.au

It's also a great time to update any changes to your email, phone number or postal address.

Since July 2018, it has been mandatory to have your cat microchipped and your cat's microchip details can also be registered in the DACO database. Cats are Australia's second most popular pet and by having their microchip details logged at DACO lost cats have a better chance to be reunited with their owners.

The DACO website manages registration, microchipping information and breeder information and really is your one-stop-shop for all the details related to your dogs and cats. Log in today and check everything is up to date; it only takes a moment.

EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE FOR NEW ARRIVALS

PAE is working with Sonder Employment Solutions to make it easier for migrants and refugees to find work. The service is entirely voluntary and is not connected to Centrelink or Job Service Providers.

COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER IN KILBURN

Our four Community development officers have been out and about in Kilburn and Blair Athol working with the local community to plan and deliver programs and opportunities.

They also collaborate with other community organisations to offer further community involvement and support through these partnerships.

One popular project is Welcome to our Butterfly Garden, which was launched in May with support from the New Dawn Christian Church and the Kilburn Neighbourhood Watch SA, as part of the Bringing Back the Butterflies project with the Australian Association for Environmental Education SA. Locals can watch the butterflies flutter by in a special garden built in the front of the Centre, where native shrubs and trees have been planted to attract butterfly species common to the area.

PAE has also partnered with the Anti-Poverty Network and a Kilburn Community Centre volunteer for Community Cook-ups, designed for people on low incomes or who find it hard to cook for one person. People gather on the second Monday of the month to cook and eat a meal together, with any leftovers taken home to put in the freezer for later.

Eva Leydo is the choir organiser and an English teacher at the Junction Community Centre. Until joining the choir, she had never learnt to read music or sing, but she said that Sean gave her the confidence and showed her that everyone can sing. "Singing has made me a much happier person and I love meeting new people and making friends," she said.

Age is no barrier to Fixing the Blues, just ask 80-year-old Audrey Kemmett, the oldest person in the choir. She also plays the drums and her involvement is already helping the choir to enjoy the rhythm and beauty of music. NAVY'S BIGGEST SHIP DOCKS AT OUTER HARBOR

Royal Australian Navy ship *HMAS Adelaide* docked at Outer Harbor in April for a short stay in PAE.

Commissioned in 2015, this is only the second time the largest ship in the Royal Australian Navy has visited her namesake port.

Thousands of people flocked to watch the arrival, take a tour, or simply just marvel at the 230 metre long, 27,500 tonne vessel.

This Helicopter Landing Dock is supported by 450 crew with the capacity to hold 1,500 people, and supports helicopter operations around Australia and overseas.

Captain Jonathan Ley and his crew were kind enough to invite us on board and onto the Bridge, to show the view from the deck, as the ship entered the channel and pulled in to shore. See the video and learn more about the ship on our website or social media.

A DELIVERY OF GOOD NEIGHBOURS

Kylie Agnew of Clearview was "surprised but also very happy" to discover that her neighbour Lisa was allocated to assist her with the delivery of her first child.

Kylie had registered with the Women and Children's Hospital Midwife Group Practice program, which provides mums-tobe care by their own midwife who gets to know them during the pregnancy, is on call for the birth and provides four weeks of postnatal care in the woman's home. The program helps women form a bond with their midwife, so in Kylie's case it was an opportunity to be supported through her pregnancy by a neighbour she had known for many years.

In March, Kylie nominated Lisa to be recognised in our Appreciate Your Neighbour competition, as part of our celebration of Good Neighbour Day. This project is part of our acknowledgement of the importance of neighbours for the overall health and wellbeing of our community, and Lisa was one of five competition winners. She said that when she found out from the hospital that her neighbour was going to be her midwife, it seemed like the olden days of the 'village midwife'.

"She would walk down to my house for our appointments, and she helped me bring two healthy boys into the world and I feel lucky to call Lisa my dear friend and great neighbour. We regularly catch up for coffee and we look out for each other and our homes."

We also congratulate our other winners; Sarah from Exeter who was nominated by Yvette, Melanie and Greg of Enfield who were nominated by Hanna, and Jenny from Clearview who was nominated by Trish.

Eager foodies sampled the new and traditional flavours of some of our newly arrived communities in a relaxed setting in stunning Stockade Park. The event featured shared tables, food tastings and produce stalls and food trucks offering delicious food from Ethiopia, Afghanistan, Tibet, Albania, Egypt, Syria, East Turkistan, Malaysia, Russia, Persia, Somalia and Pakistan.

Timothy Molineux was awarded the 2019 Excellence in Training Award. He was the first Civil Construction Trainee to join the PAE program after completing his Certificate II in Civil Construction through local business Maxima Group, Port Adelaide.

He has since gained his Certificate III in Road Maintenance and became a full-time PAE employee in June 2018. He has worked with Council teams on drainage maintenance, line marking, road repairs, concrete and paving. Timothy is regarded as a valuable team member, and has become a Health and Safety representative.

Lu-Cinda Spear won the 2019 Most Outstanding Student in Civil Construction. After completing her TAFE SA Certificate III in Civil Construction and Plant Operations, Lu-Cinda joined PAE in February 2018. Over the past 12 months she has gained experience in road and drain maintenance, line marking and footpaths, and recently she beat a high calibre of internal and external applicants for a fulltime PAE role with the Civil Construction team.

Mark Buckerfield, Director of City Assets said that the program had support from Team Leaders within PAE, and the quality of candidates had risen over time, with a high calibre of participants, who benefit from on-the-job learning while studying.

"We hope to continue this program, as it not only helps in the career development of individual staff, but it also lifts the standard across our teams."

A NEW MEN'S SHED FOR OAKDEN

PAE is working in partnership with Northgate Oakden Residents Association to develop a Men's Shed as part of the north east corner of Enfield Community Centre at 540 Regency Road Enfield.

The Men's Shed initiative started from the iconic backyard sheds that were part of Australian life back in the day. Back then it was principally a man's domain and if you looked inside you might see men making furniture, restoring bicycles for a local school, fixing lawn mowers or making a cubby house for their family, a charity or the local kindergarten. While they worked together you might also see young men learning something about life from men with different life experiences.

Our modern Men's Shed is based on this part of Australian history and culture but with a modern twist for men in today's world. Although we live in different times, some men still haven't learnt to talk about their feelings and emotions, and many do not take an interest in their own health and well-being. Men's Sheds aim to provide a safe place where men can talk with mates in a supportive environment.

A steering committee will be set up, and potential members recruited over the coming months.

SHARING A PIECE OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA WITH OUR FRIENDS IN FRANCE

As part of our civic relationship with Cherbourg-en-Cotentin in France, we commissioned two South Australian artists to create a large collaborative mural on the wall of a police station in Cherbourg. The purpose of this exchange is to share Australian art and culture with Cherbourg and to give them a little bit of Wonderwalls as a symbol of the relationship between our two cities. This is the first part of a reciprocal arrangement in which Port Adelaide hopes to subsequently host a French artist with connections to Cherbourg at a future date.

This piece has a connection with the artwork behind the visitor Information Centre in Port Adelaide painted during the 2017 TARNANTHI Festival of Contemporary Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art, and other works created during the 2015 and 2017 Wonderwalls Festival.

South Australian artist Jimmy C now lives in England and is an internationally recognised street artist. He has painted for the Port Adelaide Wonderwalls festival in the past and is probably best known locally for his purple and yellow birds and hearts mural on Todd Street, as well as his famous mural of David Bowie in Brixton, England, which has become a shrine to the musician.

Aboriginal artist Elizabeth Close is an Adelaide based artist, and this exchange is the first time she has taken her work overseas. She has featured in Wonderwalls Port Adelaide and was commissioned to complete a wall as part of TARNANTHI in the Port event in October 2017.

Our civic relationship with Cherbourg is based around business opportunities, economic development education & training, sport, environment, art, culture and tourism, stemming from the involvement of both regions in Australia's Future Submarines program.

LIGHTS, CAMERA AND ACTION IN PAE

With our heritage buildings, unique architecture and picturesque beachfront, PAE is fast becoming a popular destination for film shoots.

While settings such as the woolsheds in the Port and Semaphore foreshore have been long-time favourites for local photographers, they are now gaining more and more traction as locations for international filmmakers.

Recently, Harry Potter favourite, Daniel Radcliffe was here with a full crew to film his new movie Escape from Pretoria, with filming taking place in our Town Hall as well as locations around Port Adelaide. Australian icon Jackie Weaver was also spotted in Largs filming for an upcoming movie, Never Too Late.

In the past we've also had a popular Chinese TV soap opera crew film stunts around the streets in Port Adelaide and Semaphore, and there has been a whole host of smaller productions shot locally, from TV shows, to car commercials, to skate videos.

A LASTING MEMORIAL TO OUR ANZACS

Construction of a memorial to Australian Army soldiers is now complete at the Gilles Plains and Hampstead RSL in Manningham, and was ready for use at this year's ANZAC dawn service.

The shelter respectfully acknowledges the Australian Army Slouch Hat with the 'Rising Sun' badge and the puggaree on the hat with the seven folds of the puggaree reflected in the design of the shelter, while blending into the surrounding environment and existing building. The shelter, with surrounding landscaping, sits in front of a memorial to military personnel and an Australian flag pole which flies our flag proudly at the rear.

The shelter, which will be lit at night, was first used for this year's ANZAC Day service and is open to the public to use every other day of the year. The project was funded by the Government of South Australia, with the design and construction project managed by the City of PAE.

SALA FESTIVAL CELEBRATES SA ARTISTS

We are proud to support this year's annual SALA (South Australian Living Artists) Festival - a statewide celebration of visual art from 1 to 31 August.

The SALA Festival was established in 1998 and this year there are plenty of SALA exhibitions and events across the City, in galleries, cafes, pubs, libraries and community centres.

Adelaide's biggest art trail; After Dark - SALA in the Port, is returning for its third year. Taking place on Friday 9 August, After Dark is a one-night-only event where visitors can walk the art trail between venues lit by lanterns, enjoying the exhibitions as well as all the great food, live music and atmosphere that the Port has to offer.

A MAJOR INVESTMENT IN STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

The \$4 million Marmion Avenue stormwater project in Kilburn and Blair Athol has now been completed after two years of work, coming in under budget and on time.

Known as the North East Catchment, the project included installation of a culvert from Main North Road to the open channel just west of Prospect Road to help alleviate some of the flooding in the local area, particularly along Grand Junction Road.

Residents of PAE have experienced stormwater flooding since the first settlers began development in the Port Adelaide area in 1837 due to the low-lying levels of the land. Since 1996, we have invested significantly in stormwater infrastructure to help mitigate the impacts of flooding to the community, with funding support from the State Government.

Although we have completed many stormwater projects over the last twenty years, protecting hundreds of homes from flooding, there are still a significant number of major stormwater projects we are still to undertake over a 10-year capital works project across the city, with a budget of approximately \$10 million per year.

TRACKING OUR TREES

Year 6 and 7 students from Ocean View College will have the opportunity to learn about the value of their local trees thanks to the support from PAE's Environment Community Program.

Interesting tree facts such as tree carbon offset, tree shading and oxygen levels produced by a tree will be collected and logged in the field by students with the use of smart devices where information can be interpreted and edited with guidance from a local Ecologist. The information is then showcased using common language on tree tags, similar to the ones we installed in the Port Adelaide historic precinct earlier in the year.

Students and teachers alike are excited about the project, as it presents an ideal opportunity for younger generations to learn about the importance of trees in their local area.

The simple act of planting trees represents the belief that the tree will grow and someday provide habitat for wildlife, help control erosion, provide shelter from the wind and sun and be an inspiration for all of our community to enjoy. More than 160 people from our local community planted more than 3,500 trees at last year's Arbor Day event.

The Arbor Day event is part of a long-term water course restoration project winding along the River Torrens it will also include a nature play area for children, fun nature discovery activities including "Slugs and Bugs Adventure" as well as a coffee van and free B.B.Q. SAY NO TO PLASTIC STRAWS

Four years ago, Laura Carrington moved to Largs Bay and was shocked at the number of plastic straws she saw washing up on the beach. She took it upon herself to clean up our natural environment by collecting plastic straws with her family and has now amassed a collection of over 1500.

As well as being involved in local environmental programs such as Adopt-A-Spot and Semaphore compost network, she also spreads awareness online. Her Facebook and Instagram pages 'Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Radelaide' have been online since 2016, as a place for like-minded people to connect. As a hobby photographer, the photos she shares of her clean-ups and collections are eye-catching and engaging, which helps her to spread the message.

Laura said, "the litter often isn't something people do on purpose, but is a by-product of plastic straws simply existing, where the weather blows them around or birds pick them out of bins". She added "An overflowing bin isn't a bin so hold on to your rubbish until you find one with space."

Her advice for people is to just pick up a few things but stay safe, "Tidying up our environment isn't as gross as people might think. Always be conscious of your own safety and use gloves, tongs and a bag or bucket."

Laura approaches local businesses and encourages them to ditch plastic straws in favour of reusable option, and notes that the community attitude has changed over the years, "People are realising that you don't have to give up anything to start using reusable straws or reusable containers, other than to change your thinking towards it."

"When you order takeaway or get a drink with your meal, ask for no straw, it's as simple as that."

Laura is currently collaborating with our City of PAE waste management team, helping to advise on waste education and environmental programs in the community.

PORT PLAZA NOW OPEN

As part of the \$45 million redevelopment, Stage I of the newly transformed Port Adelaide Plaza is celebrating the opening of several new stores to provide further services to meet the everyday needs of the Port Adelaide community.

Coinciding with the opening is the commencement of the Stage 2 construction due for completion mid-2020. The project will assist in stimulating the local economy, boosting employment and offering further opportunities. It is estimated the redevelopment will generate an additional 120 construction jobs and 160 full time retail jobs.

The Centre will expand from 19,000 square metres to over 29,394 square metres with an end value of \$133 million - making it the most significant retail development of its kind in the local area in 40 years.

The Centre (owned and managed by The Precision Group of Companies) will be rebuilt and extended to include 50+ specialty retailers, cafés, commercial premises, restaurants and Paisley Park Early Learning Centre. The new Centre will be a collection of pedestrian friendly and inspirational spaces to explore, savour and enjoy, allowing locals and visitors alike to soak up the unique atmosphere, a melting pot of historic quality and new-found confidence.

STRATEGIC OPPORTUNITIES

The City of PAE holds high strategic importance to the State and National economy, so in the lead up to the Federal election, we highlighted some of the key strategic projects, assets and partnership opportunities in which we would like to partner with the Federal Government.

Our Ask of Government document was sent to candidates in the PAE area, asking them how their parties can work with PAE to deliver our key projects in the future.

Major projects to benefit the region include:

- The construction of a light rail corridor between the Adelaide CBD and Port Adelaide and Outer Harbor which is crucial for the continued revitalisation of Port Adelaide, while maximising economic, social and environmental benefits for our community.
- The Klemzig "park and ride" interchange is needed to meet the growing demands of residents in the area wanting to access the O-Bahn.
- Construction of priority "seawall" protection for Outer and Inner Harbour coastline of the Port River to protect infrastructure against flooding from the predicted rise in sea levels.
- Relocation of Croydon Kings Soccer Club to Regency Park Oval and Thomas Turner Reserve upgrade.
- Stormwater upgrades and construction of pump station, catchment basins and drains to reduce flooding.
- Development of Maritime Heritage Precinct and Port Adelaide Fish Market to activate Dock Two.
- Development of an Aboriginal Cultural Centre in Port Adelaide.
- A program to assist local small and medium businesses to transition into the defence sector, as part of the new \$90 billion Naval Shipbuilding Precinct at Osborne.
- Lighting upgrade and installation of outdoor fitness equipment for Linear Park.
- Activation of town squares in Kilburn and Port Adelaide as part of two of the largest suburban renewal projects in Greater Adelaide.
